
What have the Grants achieved on gender equality so far?

Lessons learned




- Strengthening gender equality requires a comprehensive approach
 - Gender discrimination leading to gender-based violence, skewed work-life balance and unequal pay and conditions is deeply entrenched into the fabric of our societies and concerns multiple areas;
 - It needs to be tackled bravely, from different angles if we are to make actual progress towards a more equal society
 - That means two things:
 - We need to work together;
 - The impact of single initiatives are only meaningful if we are able to see them in broader context.
- Bilateral cooperation is a unique added value of the Grants in this field
 - Securing international partnerships in gender equality projects can be difficult using existing funding instruments;
 - Important to get the most out of partnerships, focusing on
 - Mutual exchange and learning
 - Working toward shared aims (two-way street)




