Mission

Use a multi-disciplinary approach to promote gender equality and social justice in developing, conflict and post-conflict countries through: 1) strengthening skills of professionals, scholars and organizations, 2) high-quality, collaborative and policy-relevant research, 3) creating a platform for transnational dialogue and knowledge exchange.

- MA and PhD programmes are under preparation.






